Week of Respect Activities

October 3-7, 2016

■ The week of October 3rd – 7th was designated as the **Week of Respect** in accordance with the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights. School districts throughout the state are required to observe the week by providing age appropriate instruction focusing on preventing **H**arassment, **I**ntimation or **B**ullying.

DUTCH NECK SCHOOL

- Morning Announcement The theme of Respect will be highlighted each morning during announcements.

- The school counselor will continue to present lessons concentrated on conflict resolution, friendship and acceptance.
- Grade level anti-bullying presentations will have been presented to all students by this week with a focus on being kind, respectful and making good choices.
- Students will show respect for each other when they participate in teambuilding activities on Field Day this month.

TOWN CENTER

- Morning Meeting activities/discussions centered around the day's themes. Powerpoint with greeting, discussion, message, activity will be shared with teachers

 - o Friday: Show Respect in School (Wear school colors)
- Daily Announcements over the loudspeaker or Gator News about Respect
- Whole School Morning Meeting on Friday: school-wide assembly centered around the character theme of "respect"
- Respect Game: Students will be given a game board with respectful actions they can do at home/school. Once students complete a certain number of tasks, they can add their name to the "respect chain" to show TC how many respectful actions we were able to do
- Anti-Bullying Pledge: students will sign the TC Anti-Bullying Pledge
- Classroom Read-Alouds: list of suggested literature will be sent out to teachers
- Classroom Guidance lessons on Respect/Tolerance/Empathy throughout fall

Wicoff School

- The character education theme for September was *Teamwork* and the theme for October is *Respect*. These themes will be incorporated throughout lesson plans, counselor visits and school wide activities.
- Wicoff will participate in National Walk Your Child to School Day on October 5th in coordination with the Plainsboro Police
 Department. The students will make posters with safety tips which will be displayed along the route of the walk. Staff will
 emphasize respect for community members during this activity.
- Wake Up Wicoff Students will make weekly announcements over the loudspeaker incorporating quotes dealing with respect.
- On Friday the principal will lead the school in the *Pledge of Allegiance* and discuss respect and share guotes, poems, etc.
- We will kick-off our Bus Buddies Program (bus safety) during the Week of Respect.
- We coordinated efforts with the PTA assembly chairperson to hold an anti-bullying assembly on October 6th. (The Simon Sez Guy teaches Wicoff School about respect).
- Morning meetings will be initiated with various topics including "respect".
- The guidance counselor will teach anti-bullying lessons in each of the classrooms. The focus will be on respecting each other.
 This is a follow-up to the grade level anti-bullying presentations facilitated by the principal and guidance counselor on Friday,
 September 16th.
- The guidance counselor and principal facilitated an anti-bullying presentation for the staff at our first staff meeting on September 1, 2016.
- The guidance counselor and principal facilitated anti-bullying/respect presentations for parents during the Back to School Nights on Sept. 15th and 22nd.
- The guidance counselor and principal will meet with the lunch aides and reinforce conflict resolution/peacemaking skills and anti-bullying information on October 7th.
- Review ideas for Week of Respect with staff at the faculty meeting on Oct. 4th.



Definition of HIB

"Any gesture, any written, verbal or physical act, or any electronic communication, whether it be a single incident or a series of incidents, that is reasonably perceived as being motivated either by any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or a mental, physical or sensory [handicap] disability, or by any other distinguishing <u>characteristic</u>, that takes place on school property, at any school-sponsored function [or], on a school bus, or off school grounds as provided for in section 16 of P.L.2010, CHAPTER 122, that substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students"

Evidence of HIB:	Factual Findings
The student knowingly engaged in racist, homophobic, or other stereotyping behavior with the specific objective of hurting, intimidating or harassing another student	Intentional (with hate speech) and designed to harass, intimidate, or bully
The student knowingly engaged in behavior with the specific objective of hurting, intimidating, or harassing another student	Intentional (without hate speech) and designed to Harass, intimidate or bully
The student knowingly engaged in harassing, intimidating, or bullying behavior but was not aware of the potential negative impact on the victim	Intentional, but not designed to harass, intimidate or bully

WICOFF

- The character education theme for October is *Respect*. This will be incorporated throughout lesson plans, counselor visits and school wide activities. Announcements will be made throughout the month to incorporate this theme as well especially during What's Up Wicoff morning announcements. Each month a different character theme is celebrated. Some additional themes include: Respect for Self and Others, Courtesy and Good Manners, Individuality, Friendship, Responsibility, Honesty, Perseverance and Caring. School wide activities pertaining to each month's theme will be implemented this year.
- The Wicoff Crisis Action Team met to review and update all safety drill plans and procedures. Practice
 drills will take place throughout the school year. This includes lockdowns, active shooter, bomb
 threat, and evacuation drills.
- Responsive Classroom lessons will be taught by the guidance counselor and the classroom teachers
 throughout the kindergarten through third grade classrooms. Morning meetings will be initiated and
 various topics will be included such as peacemaking skills and conflict resolution skills.
- Review ideas for School Violence Awareness Week with staff at the faculty meeting on Oct. 4th.
- A student anti-bullying/respect assembly sponsored by the PTA is being held on October 6th.

Town Center

- Daily Announcements over the loudspeaker or Gator News about Peacemaking
- Classroom Read-Alouds
- Classroom Guidance lessons on Respect/Tolerance/Empathy throughout fall
- Respect Game: Students will be given a game board with respectful actions they can do at home/school. Once students complete a certain number of tasks, they can add their name to the "respect chain" to show TC how many respectful actions we were able to do

Hawk

- In an ongoing effort to create a conflict free environment, the staff uses Responsive Classroom techniques and reinforces peacemaking techniques with our students.
- We will have a Crisis Committee Meeting to discuss the effectiveness of our crisis plan, and to review our safety procedures.
- At our October morning shares, we will have staff members share responsive classroom techniques/strategies
 used in the classroom to prevent bullying and to promote a sense of community in the classroom and
 throughout the school
- The guidance counselor will continue to present classroom lessons on conflict resolution, anti-bullying, friendship, and acceptance.
- Our PTA supports assemblies with an anti-bullying message.
- We are hosting Bagel and Books for our staff and parents. Themes such as acceptance, diversity, respect and friendship will be featured.
- We are hosting a Dads' coffee to foster community relations with our parents.
- We will have a School Safety Team meeting to discuss school climate.

Dutch Neck

- During School Violence Awareness Week, Dutch Neck School will continue to focus on the Character Theme of Respect throughout October.
- Morning announcements will focus on supporting students in developing conflict resolution skills.
- An active shooter lockdown drill is planned for October 8. The West Windsor Police are invited to observe and discuss the drill.
- Classroom teachers will continue to hold morning meetings and utilize Responsive Classroom techniques to further develop appropriate social skills and a sense of community.
- Staff and students will wear white clothing in order to promote PEACE on Wednesday, October 19.
- Our guidance counselor will teach conflict resolution and problem-solving skills during her class lessons. This will include reminders to use the DEBUG strategies that Dutch Neck students use to solve problems peacefully with friends.
- The assistant principal continues to work with lunch aides to familiarize them with Responsive Classroom techniques.
- The assistant principal will meet with students during lunch/recess to reinforce appropriate behaviors and choices during this time.
- We will have a Crisis Committee Meeting in October to discuss the effectiveness of our crisis plan, and to review our safety procedures.
- Media Specialist will have the following books available for classroom teachers to use for readaloud and discussion. Examples include: <u>Is It Right to Fight?</u> by Pat Thomas and <u>Hands Are Not for Hitting</u> by Martine Agassi.

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 We met with students to promote "Bucket Filling", focusing on positive behavior and doing kind deeds for others.

Village

- Lesson ideas regarding safety will be shared with teachers.
- Teachers may sign-up for the principal, assistant principal, or guidance counselor to complete a read-a-loud in their classrooms. The staff member who visits the class will bring a story to read to the class pertaining to being aware of others and facilitate a discussion regarding its themes.
- The school's "Question of the Week" will prompt students to reflect on matters relating to being aware of how their actions impact others.
- Guidance lessons will be completed in classrooms throughout the month of October.
- Books regarding respect and friendship will be set aside in the library for teachers to use with their students.

Millstone River

- Lesson ideas will be sent to teachers that build on the Respect Lessons facilitated by Counselors during "Week of Respect."
- Quotes regarding awareness and respect of others will be read over the morning announcements each day of the week.
- Daily challenges will be announced each morning urging students to be agents of change with regard to safe, kind, courteous and respectful behaviors.
- Guidance lessons will continue in classrooms throughout the month of October.
- Counselors will begin Anger Management Groups in the month of October to provide strategies to students needing assistance in managing unsafe or aggressive behaviors.
- A book list will be sent to teachers for use in the classroom along with suggested topics for discussion regarding kind and courteous behaviors toward all students. Counselors will be available to co-facilitate discussions upon teachers' request.

Community Middle School (6-8)

- Daily announcements appropriate to the theme will be read each morning (from slideshow below*)
- Teachers are encouraged to lead students in discussion/written reflection related to quote(s) during class/flex.
- Selection of cast members for Bystander: A Portrait in Apathy will be finalized (to be performed on 11/3 & 11/4.)
- Posters from Week of Respect will remain posted.
- ABS will visit performing Arts classes for a progress check on theme-related performance project.
- Continual references will be made to "If Not Me, Then Who" character program, held 10/6.

Grover Middle School (6-8)

- Daily Quotes will be read on morning announcements (selected from slideshow below*). Teachers are encouraged to utilize a flex and/or class time for reflection on the quote(s).
- 6th Grade ABS will provide lessons through 6th Grade Computer Cycle on 10/14, in advance of SVAW
 to address preventing and dealing with Cyber-bullying, accompanied by 8th Grade Bystander cast
 members who will facilitate small group discussions.
- ABS will visit performing Arts classes on 10/18 to hear progress on creation of theme-related performance piece.
- "If Not Me, Then Who" will be held on November 1, 2016 to reiterate the character messages from both weeks. A Service Day will be established.
